
PLANT field guide

Coast Wirilda Acacia uncifolia



Closely resembles Acacia provincialis, Acacia cyclops and Acacia retinodes, and previously treated as a variety of the latter.

A. retinodes is now regarded to be endemic to the Mount Lofty Ranges in South Australia.

A. uncifolia may be distinguished from A. provincialis by its suckering habit, smaller phyllodes (leaves) with a distinctly uncinate (hooked) tip, and smaller flower heads.
