

PLANT field guide

Mount Grevillea Grevillea victoriae

When to look:

Flowering usually occurs August - January

Erect, spreading shrub growing up to 3m high and 4.5m wide. Branchlets are covered in small, white hairs.

Similar species:

Similar to *G. parvula* which is limited to the far east of Victoria and occurs in New South Wales.

G. victoriae at Mt Buffalo (Grevillea victoriae subsp. victoriae) is endemic to subalpine and alpine region of Victoria and occurs at altitudes between 1400-1900 metres Fruits are smooth and cone-shaped that measure 17 -20mm



Leaves are elliptic (oval-shaped), 6-12cm long and 10-45mm wide. Upper surface is olive green, smooth and shiny. Underside is pale green and covered in white hairs.

Flowers grow at the end of branches, are red, trumpetshaped, and measure 3-17mm long. A single stem shoots from the centre of the flower, measuring up to 9cm.
